Throughout history, the sufferers of leprosy have often been ostracised by society. An intense fear of leprosy still persists, leading to stigmatisation of affected persons and their families.

Leprosy is a chronic, infectious disease. It affects the skin and peripheral nerves and if left untreated, there can be permanent damage to the skin, nerves, limbs and eyes. About 70% of the world's registered leprosy patients live in India.

- **New sanitation block and Occupational Therapy Unit built** at Leprosy Hospital in Occupied Kashmir

In Srinagar, Occupied Kashmir, Muslim Hands has been supporting a Leprosy Hospital. Through your generosity, the patients at this hospital have received food, clothing and blankets regularly over the past five years.

This year we built a new sanitation block at the hospital and have opened an 'occupational therapy unit' which also generates some income for the hospital.
